Lesson Review

Every tenth lesson in the curriculum is designed to be a review lesson. The younger grades will be doing various activities and reviewing the teaching. You may choose to do some sort of review activity; have a time of discussion, reflecting on what has been taught in the unit; or use the following video resource to extend or reinforce the concepts that have been taught.

Apologetics Focus: Scripture under Scrutiny Video (35 min.)

Many people, both Christians and skeptics, struggle with answering the question of how we got the Bible and why we can trust it. In this video, Pastor Brian Edwards explores the topic of the inspiration of Scripture and what makes it unique with respect to every other book in the world.

After showing the video, use these questions to engage the class in discussion.

- How has your understanding of the inspiration of Scripture changed as a result of our lessons in this unit and what was taught in this video?
- Christians can think of the Bible as the history book of the universe. Why is the Bible not used as a history textbook in most history classrooms today?
- The authority of the Bible is founded upon its inerrancy, inspiration, and sufficiency. What happens to the authority of the Bible if we deny any one of these aspects?
- What makes the Bible unique when compared to other books?
- What is the relationship between our understanding of our origins and our standard of morality?
- What passages of Scripture are most encouraging to you as you consider your trust in the Bible? Should we use the Bible's claims about itself to show unbelievers that the Bible is trustworthy? Why or why not?
- If the Bible is the ultimate authority, can scientific or archaeological evidence prove it to be true or false?
- How would you personally explain the inspiration of the Bible to a skeptic?
- What questions do you still have about the Bible and its trustworthiness?
